# Our Origins

Economic Security for Illinois, est. Feb. 2019

Our organization is young-- we were formed in February 2019 in light of a City of Chicago task force which aimed to tackle the economic insecurity many families were feeling.

Our first policy recommendations?

- EITC expansion & modernization
- A Chicago guaranteed income pilot
- Policies beyond cash transfers to bolster the social safety net

In our 3 years, we have grown to win over \$200 million in direct cash relief with the partnership of 40+ nonprofit + labor partners & passed policies at the City, County, and State.


# The Problem: Poverty 1.5 million





# Expand the Earned Income Credit

Expand existing credit to more people & give more money.

#### Establish a Child Tax Credit

Like the federal CTC, a state CTC would give parents a monthly check to support their families.

### Adopt a guaranteed income

Take private or public funds and give them back directly to the people in monthly recurring checks.

### Give direct cash transfers

Like a guaranteed income, but only once. Think stimulus checks.





### One-time cash wins

# (Public/Private) #GiveTogetherNow fund for restaurant workers

Our first victory was an immediate response to the start of the pandemic: in early 2020, we worked with UpTogether & Chicago Independent Restaurants to a fund for workers impacted by COVID-19. Supported by the City of Chicago, we raised over \$3.3 million dollars to provide cash payments to 6,000 Chicago families.

# Cook County's one-time \$600 direct cash transfer

President Preckwinkle used CARES funding to establish the Resident Cash Assistance
Program, a \$600 one-time cash transfer for Suburban Cook County families impacted by COVID at 250% FPL.
The program gave \$11M in assistance.


# State of Illinois direct cash to immigrant families

At the state-level, we won \$65 million to support immigrants, who were left out of the CARES Act stimulus payments, with \$20 million intended to fund direct cash payments, distributed by Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights.

TOTAL: \$112 million in direct cash

## Guaranteed income wins











#### City of Evanston

Public partnership with **Northwestern University** 

\$1 Million 1 year of \$500 monthly payments 150 residents in 3 groups: Youth (18-24) Senior citizens (over 62) Undocumented residents

Lottery system.

#### **Chicago Resilient Communities Pilot**

City of Chicago

\$31.5 Million 5,000 residents 1 year of \$500 monthly payments

Lottery system.

First payments went out in June 2022.

#### **Chicago Futures Fund**

#### **Equity and Transformation**

Program designed by & for system people in West Garfield Park.

18 months, \$500/month, 30 recipients.

Second year expected to start distribution of another \$1M.

#### **Cook County Promise**

#### Nation's largest public pilot


\$42 Million 3,250 residents 2 years of \$500 monthly payments.

Lottery system. This pilot will become a permanent policy.

Applications open Oct. 6, 2022; payments in December

Payments start in Nov 2022.





# Our Tax Equity Vision

Comprehensive proposal developed before January 2022

- Expand the Earned Income Credit (EIC) that makes the following excluded groups eligible:
  - Young adults 18-24
  - Older adults 65+
  - Immigrants who file taxes with an ITIN number
- Double the amount of EIC credit: increase the existing match of the federal EITC from 18% to 36% over three years for all filers
- Create a \$600 annual Child Tax Credit for all caregivers
- Expand the net to include people with low- or no- earnings who do not file taxes
- Provide a simple portal to file taxes for low and zero income individuals



# EIC History

#### 2014

A campaign increased the credit to 14% of a match to the federal EITC (they fought for 20%). Together with some of our same coalition partners, they helped create a foundation so legislators knew how important this was.

#### 2022

Our coalition runs, and WINS, a campaign to expand the EIC to 20% and include ITIN filers, 18-24 & 65+ year olds without children.

#### 2000

A tax credit matching the popular, bipartisan EITC is introduced, and passed, in the Illinois General Assembly.

#### 2018

EIC is increased to 18%.

#### 2020 & 2021

We form and grow our coalition to over 40 members from across the state, and run bills with bipartisan majorities in both House and Senate, but don't expand EIC

### Our '22 State EIC Win

#### EXPAND EIC ELIGIBILITY.

Extend the credit to 950,000+ more Illinoisans who are currently excluded.

- 1. Young adults ages 18-24 without children
- 2. Older adults over 65 years of age
- 3.ITIN filers (immigrants who file their taxes with a individual taxpayer identification number)

#### INCREASE EIC CREDIT AMOUNT.

Move from 18% to a 20% match of EITC.

#### ONE-TIME CASH TO FAMILIES.

Most Illinois families will get \$50 per individual plus \$100 each for up to three child dependents.





#### STATE TASK FORCE URGES GOVERNMENT, BUSINESSES TO UNITE ON 'QUALITY JOBS'

The job market in Illinois will continue to polarize, with most growth in high- and lowwage occupations, increasing the need for government and the private sector to support work with family-sustaining benefits, a bipartisan task force established by the state Legislature said Tuesday.

The 36-member panel said Illinois could "be a national leader in aligning business and worker needs through defining and enhancing job quality." It said state government should realign its grants in workforce training and other programs to support jobs with benefits such as health insurance and family
