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METHODOLOGY



Survey n= 713 likely voters in NY-04 and 855 likely voters in AZ-06 between July 9 - 12, 2024



Respondents were recruited via dynamic online sampling to obtain a sample reflective of the population.



Post-stratification performed on age, gender, race/ethnicity, education, and 2020 presidential vote. Weighting parameters were based on voter file data.



The modeled margin of error is 4.0% in NY-04 and 3.8% in AZ-06

Generic Ballot


- The generic Democratic candidate is leading in NY-04, 46 to 40.
- The Democratic and Republican candidates are statistically tied in AZ-06.
- U.S. Congressional Head to Head
 - Democrat Laura Gillen is leading in NY-04 and Democrat Kristen Engel is statistically tied with both of the potential Republican opponents in AZ-06 before messages.



If the election for the U.S. House of Representatives were held today, and the candidates were the following, who would you vote for?




[NY-04] U.S. Congressional Ballot - Before Messages






Below are two potential approaches to reducing the deficit. Which approach do you prefer?





Do you support or oppose raising taxes on corporations and billionaires to reduce the tax burden on middle-class families?




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


Do you support or oppose raising taxes on corporations and billionaires if it could provide additional funding for housing, childcare, and healthcare programs, potentially benefiting all Americans?





Voters are less likely to vote for GOP against Child Tax Credit in AZ-06






